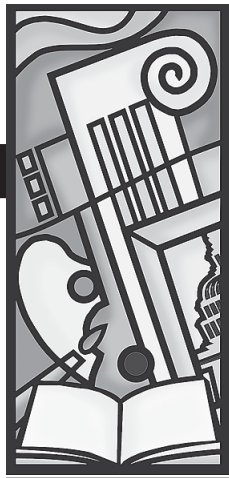

From the Editor:

The West Virginia Archives and History Library prides itself on its service to the public. We take our responsibility to collect and preserve the state's history in all its forms very seriously, but we also strongly believe that our second—and equal—responsibility is to make our collections accessible to the public, employing the skills, experience and knowledge of our staff to facilitate our patrons in finding all we have to offer on a subject and in understanding what they find. Our new online public access catalog will assist both staff and patrons in exploring the cataloged collections with greater ease and speed. Meanwhile, as limited staff time allows, we will work toward adding more items in our collections to the new Voyager® catalog.

Ex Libris™ Voyager® Bringing New Online Catalog to Archives Library

The West Virginia Archives and History Library of the West Virginia Division of Culture and History, in conjunction with the West Virginia Library Commission, will launch a new integrated library system to improve management and accessibility of library collections. Voyager® combines state-of-the-art technology and an intuitive, easy-to-learn user interface in a system designed specifically for academic and research libraries, helping to make it one of the most widely used library automation systems in the world. Funding for the system is provided by the Library Services and Technology Act administered by the Institute of Museum and Library Services and the West Virginia Library Commission. According to J. D. Waggoner, Secretary of the West Virginia Library Commission, acquiring the Voyager® integrated library system for the Library Commission Library and the Archives and History Library completes a multiyear project to upgrade

systems in libraries throughout the state and provides improvements in service to the state's library users. Director of Archives and History, Fredrick H. Armstrong, sees the Voyager® system providing easier and faster access to the specialized collections of the Archives and History Library. He also pointed out that the similarities in the access method for the online catalog and the

search methods employed by family history researchers who rely on Internet research will enhance their search skills and generate greater success in locating the titles and special collections items so beneficial to this research. The online catalog will initially include all of the materials included in the old system, with new books added regularly.

Paden City 2007 Labor Day Film Festival Features Archives Clips

The Paden City Fraternal Order of the Eagles is sponsoring its third annual Labor Day Film Festival on Labor Day weekend, beginning Friday, August 31, and running through Monday, September 3. Films will be shown at the Order of the Eagles Club, across the street from the Paden City Public Library. The Library is a co-sponsor of the Film Festival, which has been endorsed by the Board of the West Virginia Labor History Association. The films all

have labor-related themes, including unions, coal mining and coal camps, the pottery industry, labor relations, mine disasters and more. Items in collections currently not fully included in the online catalog, such as microfilm, special collections and manuscripts, will be added to the catalog as staff time allows.

Library staff will gain sophisticated means of handling such library management tasks as acquisitions, serials check-in with subscription renewal and missed issue reminders, cataloging and more, while library patrons will benefit immensely from the creation of a new Online Public Access Catalog. Although the Archives and History Library and the Library Commission Library are sharing the catalog, each library will have a separate interface to the online catalog to accommodate their very different patron bases and the greatly varying services provided by each library. Patrons can choose to search one library or both libraries, and can add the Library of Congress or other selected West Virginia academic and public libraries to the search via Web links. The concept of Voyager® is that of an easy-to-navigate voyage through a sea of databases, which is indicated by the use of sailboat-theme

illustrations and icons. Users will find the new online catalog to be much easier to use than the current one, with search mechanisms and features similar to those of today's online search systems. Novice researchers will appreciate the easy-to-learn interface, while more sophisticated searchers will value its wealth of options to define and limit search criteria. The system empowers library users to generate results without hands-on instruction.

what the copy costs would be. Instructions and fee information for research letters can be found in the May 2007 issue of *West Virginia Archives and History News*, in our brochure, and on our Web site at <http://www.wvculture.org/history/services.html>. If you do not have access to the Internet, visit your local public library (most offer free or low cost Internet access), or call the Archives and History Library Reference Desk at (304) 558-0230, to see if the subject or surname you need is available.

Historic Preservation Survey and Planning Grants Applications

The State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) of the West Virginia Division of Culture and History is now accepting applications for historic preservation survey and planning grants. Approximately \$80,000 is earmarked for this grant program, which is funded with money appropriated by the U.S.

Congress for preservation efforts through the National Park Service Historic Preservation Fund. State or local government agencies, not-for-profit organizations or firms, and educational institutions are eligible to apply. Eligible projects include architectural and archaeological

surveys, preparation of nominations to the National Register of Historic Places, heritage education programs relating to preservation activities, pre-development activities, and comprehensive planning documents and development projects. Funded projects must be completed by June 30, 2009.

Grant funds are awarded on a matching basis. A competitive process is used to determine the recipients, with the final decision being made by the West Virginia Archives and History Commission. The Commission selects projects that best meet the established priorities and criteria. Development projects will be considered only when all of the justifiable funding needs of eligible projects in other categories have been addressed. All grant monies must be administered in accordance with federal and state requirements. The deadline for applications is October 31, 2007.
