



Lecture – "Survey and Documentation of Hampshire County Cemeteries"

Lecture: "Beneath the Poppies and Crosses: What Archaeology Reveals about the First World War" By Hank Lutton, Curator, Grave Creek Mound Archaeological Complex.

"We Shall Remain: Tecumseh's Vision" (90 min). The story of Shawnee leader Tecumseh and his brother, Tenskwatawa, the Prophet. While the Prophet lead a spiritual revival movement, Tecumseh forged a political and military alliance that united members of tribes from across the Midwest.
